15. I See Me In the Book! Using Multicultural Children's Literature and Multi-genre Approaches to Increase Student Engagement During Expanded Learning

Multicultural children's literature is defined as books by and about people of color – African and African-American, American Indian, Asian/Pacific and Asian Pacific American, and Latino – that accurately portray the culture of their characters through rich detail. Scholars agree that when children "see" themselves in books they become more motivated to read and read more often. With the changing landscape of our communities, we need to provide more opportunities for children to not only see themselves in books, but to read about the experiences of others. Through this session we will explore the world of multicultural (especially African-American) children's literature, and learn about some of the most popular and well-regarded books for children in this field. We will also discuss how to increase student engagement and literacy development during expanded learning time using multi-genre approaches, which allow children to deepen their engagement with books by responding to what they read using a variety of genres: poems, speeches, creative writing, raps/songs, greeting-cards, talk shows, menus, quizzes, radio broadcasts... and the list goes on!

With current estimates that autism affects one percent of the population, leisure and recreation service providers can expect to interact with people who have autism as part of their regular activities and events. As part of this educational community outreach initiative of Children's Specialized Hospital, participants will identify ways to help kids understand autism spectrum disorder and learn strategies to facilitate friendships among children of all abilities. This program encourages recognition of children's similarities, reinforces the common desire to be accepted and have friends, demystifies autism in an age-appropriate manner and promotes inclusion, respect and friendship among children. Participants will receive materials and resources to encourage understanding and acceptance and to reduce intimidation and bullying.
