IMPORTANT!!!

As of October 2017, the PINJ Registry has changed to the NJ Workforce Registry. Anyone who was in the PINJ registry will be in the NJ Workforce Registry. All previous PINJ Registry ID's are still valid and are now known as NJ Workforce Registry ID's.

If you do not have a PINJ Registry ID you will need to get a NJ Workforce ID to attend NJSACC trainings. The process is simple and will take a few minutes of your time.

Please follow these steps to register in the NJ Workforce Registry:

1. Go to www.njccis.com and click Log In in the upper right hand corner of the screen.
2. On the next screen click Register in the gray bar that asks if you are a new user.
3. On the next screen fill in all the required information. It will ask you what you are requesting approval for. Please select either Director, ECE Assistant Teacher or ECE Teacher. Then click Register in the lower right hand corner.
4. You should receive an email to activate your account.
5. When you log in to your account, click on the Account tab and select Profile.
6. On the Profile page, click Print Membership Card to see your ID number. This is the number you will need to register for the conference and other training events. Finding the balance to a quality afterschool program is an ongoing process. NJSACC: The Statewide Network for NJ's Afterschool Communities - with support from the C. S. Mott Foundation and the NJ Department of Education - convened a group of afterschool leaders to answer the question, "What does quality look like in an afterschool program?"

The NJ Quality Standards for Afterschool are organized into seven categories:

- Administration
- Human Relationships
- Safety and Environmental Health
- Indoor and Outdoor Environment
- Programming and Activities
- Special Needs and the Whole Child
- Health Behavior: Nutrition and Physical Activity.

The Standards for each category are numbered and in bold. The Standard Elements are listed under the bold heading with letters (a, b, c, etc.). The standard elements will help you understand how to interpret the standard and what the important things to look for are. On the following page you will see each category along with the icon that represents it. Below each Standard you will see the workshops listed by number that fall under that category. Some workshops fall into more than one category and may be listed under multiple standards.

Core Knowledge and **COMPETENCIES** for Afterschool and Youth Development Professionals

All professional societies share common characteristics. Among them are a body of knowledge and skills, culture, a code of ethics, and public recognition. The NAA Core Knowledge and Competencies have been developed to enable afterschool and youth development practitioners to demonstrate expertise and gain a higher level of recognition within their communities. NJSACC has adopted these competencies for the afterschool workforce of New Jersey.







Once again, NJSACC is pleased to bring you a series of workshops from Kids Included Together (KIT). Kids Included Together is a center of excellence on disability inclusion. KIT specialize in providing leadership, best practices, training and support to people and organizations who serve children.

In the mid 1990's, a woman named Theresa Woodard left a large bequest to the San Diego Jewish Community Foundation (JCF) with the instructions that it be used "to help children with disabilities." Marjory Kaplan, JCF CEO, decided to involve Gayle and Don Slate, new San Diego residents and parents of a child with cerebral palsy. Understanding the isolation faced by families who have children with disabilities, Gayle had a vision of helping this often overlooked group of people feel more connected to and included in their communities.

A partnership was established with the Lawrence Family Jewish Community Center (JCC) in San Diego to host an inclusive summer camp. Mary Shea was hired to create and direct the program. Mary was an experienced occupational therapist who had previously directed a three-year project at the San Diego State University Foundation, which was focused on inclusion and funded by the National Maternal and Child Health Bureau. While Gayle and Don gathered local support, Mary reached out to families of children with significant disabilities and trained the JCC staff. The program was so successful that in 1997, it became a separate nonprofit, with the mission to teach inclusive practices to child and youth programs throughout San Diego County. The KIT San Diego Affiliate program—generously funded by a variety of local corporations, foundations, and individual donors—served as a learning laboratory. Over 300 programs in San Diego County have implemented inclusive practices as a result.

In the early 2000's, word of the KIT mission began to spread beyond San Diego. Organizations from other states began asking how they could "get KIT in their community." KIT began to expand through an annual national conference on inclusion, out-of-state training, and online training programs. In 2010, KIT partnered with the Department of Defense to implement inclusion in every military child and youth program throughout the world. In 2013, KIT began work with the US Department of Education's 21st Century Community Learning Centers.

Today, KIT teaches over 20,000 learners a year, conducting training programs in 220 locations domestically and 49 internationally. KIT is simultaneously driving the national conversation on inclusion for child and youth programs while teaching inclusive practices on an international scale.

These issues present an urgent challenge and opportunity for OST programs as they continue their innovative work preparing youth for future success. A global learning framework supports youth's 21st century skills development and prepares them for college, careers, and civic engagement.
